

16th August 2023 was a very sad day for Christians in Pakistan. A mob made up of hundreds of Islamist fanatics in Faisalabad carried out one of the cruellest attacks of anti-Christian persecution that Pakistan has ever witnessed. In Jaranwala, they vandalised, threw stones and burned hundreds of homes of Christian families and nearly 20 churches, desecrating tombs, Bibles, images and crosses.

From the loudspeakers of the mosques,

they called on the local population to "go out and kill" the Christians, after rumours began to spread that a man and his son had disrespected the Quran by placing their photographs on its pages.

The terrified Christians of the city fled en masse for their lives and managed to spend the night in the sugar cane fields. The next morning, the few who returned desperately in search of food saw how everything had been destroyed, down to the last light bulb. A Christian community leader, who is not being named for security reasons, told ACN that many of

the Christians returning to Jaranwala were horrified by the extent of the damage done to their homes and were sleeping on the floor without electric light and unable to cook food.

The local Church is making continuous efforts to provide food packages, soap and other health care items, cups, plates and other basic household essentials as this recent wave of persecution has left hundreds of families devastated, with homes destroyed and lives shattered.  $\oplus$ 

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"The situation is terrifying. Christians are very scared. Please pray for our people, pray that their lives are protected. They don't know what to do or where to go," said Fr Abid Tanveer, Vicar General of the Diocese of Faisalabad.

"I ask for your prayers and call for action and solidarity with the families affected by this terrible act," said Bishop Joseph Arshad, president of the Catholic Episcopal Conference of Pakistan.

Christians in Pakistan barely represent 2% of the total population and, just because they are Christians, they are considered second-class citizens, which is why they are forced to take on the most degrading jobs in society in order to support their families.

Discrimination, false accusations of



blasphemy, kidnappings of women and girls, and forced conversions to Islam haunt their lives - on a daily basis. They are seriously threatened by those who are determined to eradicate any sign of Christianity from the country.

Their lives are in danger at every moment as they feel ignored and unprotected by the authorities. Pakistani Christians face this harsh reality every

day, heroically and without giving up their belief. But they need help to remain firm in their Faith and to guarantee the permanence of Christianity in their country.

whose livelihoods were destroyed in the attacks.

Miraculously, no Christians were killed in the attacks, but hundreds of families had to flee and lost all their possessions. Now they are being forced to stay with relatives or even out in the surrounding fields.

The local diocese has identified 464 families that are in more desperate need and has devised a plan to provide them first with immediate assistance, and then with the goods and help necessary to rebuild their lives.

"The lives of these people are in grave danger, as they struggle to survive amidst immense hardship," said Bishop Indrias Rehmat of Faisalabad to ACN.

The items required for the families include basic necessities such as clothes, kitchen appliances, bedding and

mattresses, stationary for school children and even rickshaws and motorcycles for drivers and delivery boys whose vehicles were destroyed in the attacks. They need these vehicles as the livelihood of their families depend on them.

Bishop Indrias requested financial assistance from ACN. On its part, ACN announce that it will be launching a relief project to help the Christian community in the most tangible ways. We aim to see these 464 families in particular, getting back on their feet, at the earliest possible," said Marco Mencaglia, ACN's international

director of projects.

"If needed, we are ready to consider future support for the renovation of totally burnt down homes and church buildings in Jaranwala," he added.

"We look forward to collaborating with ACN to alleviate the great suffering that these faithful but unfortunate Christians are enduring every day, nowadays.

Please allow me to extend our heartfelt gratitude to ACN's benefactors for their attention and cooperation in this matter," concluded Bishop Indrias in his urgent communication with ACN. (1)

  - An alleged desecration of the Qur'an is punishable by life imprisonment (Articles 295B Pakistan's Penal Code).
- Abductions, sexual violence, forced religious conversion, and human trafficking continue to plague Pakistan

Every year up to 1,000 Christian and Hindu women and girls, aged between 12 and 25, are abducted and many are forced to convert to Islam and marry a Muslim

Christians in Pakistan struggle to find work

Many destitute Christians in Pakistan's brick kilns are trapped in a cycle of bonded labour, essentially a type of modern slavery. They face the impossible task of repaying loans taken out to buy food and other basic necessities.
